**PROTECTIVE ORDER ON RECONSIDERATION**

On November 24, 1997 the Montana Public Service Commission issued Protective Order No. 6024 in this Docket covering certain information to be provided by U S West Communications, Inc in its 1996 annual report. That Order contained several errors at paragraph 13, Applicability/Term. In addition the Commission finds it appropriate to change certain other language in the Order to recognize that the Order is not issued within a contested case proceeding and applies only to information provided by U S West. Therefore, on its own motion, the Commission issues this Protective Order on Reconsideration, making necessary and appropriate corrections to Protective Order No. 6024.

On June 30, 1997 U S West Communications, Inc. (U S West) filed a motion with the Montana Public Service Commission (Commission or PSC) for a protective order covering information to be provided at Schedule 23 (Central Office and Access Line Statistics), Schedule 24 (Central Office and Switch Information), and Schedule 27 (Compensation of Top 10 Montana Based Employees) of its 1996 annual report. On July 8, 1997 the Commission denied the motion. Notice of Commission Action, July 10, 1997. On

September 10, 1997 U S West filed for a declaratory judgment in the Montana First Judicial District Court that it is entitled to a protective order covering Schedule 23, Schedule 24(f) (trade secrets) and Schedule 27 (right to privacy).

On November 18, 1997, the Commission, on its own motion, reconsidered and granted in part U S West's motion for protective order. The Commission decided to issue a protective order covering information to be provided pursuant to Schedule 23, Schedule 24(f) and Schedule 27 of U S West's 1996 annual report.

This order affords interested persons an opportunity to challenge the proprietary designation for information claimed to be trade secret or otherwise constitutionally protected.

In issuing this order the Commission is not deciding or expressing any opinion as to whether the subject information is or is not a trade secret, or otherwise constitutionally protected. Similarly, in issuing this order the Commission is not conceding any allegation, not previously conceded, made by U S West in its complaint for declaratory judgment in district court. Montana First Judicial District Court, Cause No. CDV 9700575.

Based upon the foregoing, the following protective order shall be in effect with respect to Schedule 23, Schedule 24(f) and Schedule 27 of the 1996 Public Service Commission annual report forms filed by U S West.

1. Proprietary Information. All documents, data and information furnished by U S West in Schedules 23, 24(f) and 27 of the 1996 PSC Annual Report Forms for Telecommunications Utilities claimed to be of a private, privileged or confidential nature shall only be furnished pursuant to the terms of this order, and shall be treated by all persons accorded access thereto pursuant to this order as constituting private,

confidential or privileged commercial and financial information (hereinafter referred to as "Proprietary Information") and shall neither be used nor disclosed except in accordance with this order. All material claimed to be Proprietary Information must be marked with an appropriate designation and submitted to the Commission on yellow paper so that it is easily identified for filing purposes.

2. Terms of Disclosure. All Proprietary Information made available pursuant to this order shall be given solely to the Commission and Montana Consumer Counsel (MCC), and shall not be used or disclosed except in accordance with this order. However, access to Proprietary Information may be authorized by the MCC (or by counsel for such other person as may acquire access to said information pursuant to Paragraph 3 below) to those persons indicated as being its expert consultants. Any such expert may not be an officer, director or employee (except legal counsel) of such person, or an officer, director, employee or stockholder, or member of an association or corporation of which any person is a member, subsidiary or affiliate. Any member of the PSC and any member of its staff, the MCC, and any member of his staff may also have access to the Proprietary Information made available pursuant to this order.

3. Petition for Proprietary Disclosure. Any person may, through counsel, specially petition the Commission for access to the Proprietary Information pursuant to the terms of this order.

Such person must demonstrate to the PSC that his or her interest relates to the ratemaking, investigatory or other regulatory function of the PSC. U S West shall receive notice of any such petition and shall have a period of 14 days thereafter to file an

objection or response prior to the Commission's ruling. If such Petition is granted by the PSC, such person shall be accorded access to the Proprietary Information pursuant to the terms of this Order, and shall be bound by all its terms.

4. Nondisclosure Agreement. Prior to giving access to Proprietary Information as contemplated in Paragraphs 2 and 3 above, counsel for a person seeking review of the Proprietary Information shall agree in writing to comply with and be bound by this order. In connection therewith, Proprietary Information shall not be disclosed to any person who has not signed a nondisclosure agreement in the form which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit "A." The nondisclosure agreement (Exhibit "A") shall require the person to whom disclosure is to be made to read a copy of this Order and to certify in writing that he has reviewed the same and has consented to be bound by its terms. The agreement shall contain the signatory's full name, permanent address, and employer. Such agreement shall be delivered to counsel for U S West and the Commission.

5. Challenge to Confidentiality. This order establishes a procedure for the expeditious handling of information that U S West claims is confidential; but it shall not be construed as an agreement or ruling on the confidentiality of any such information. Any person, or the Commission on its own motion, may challenge U S West's claim of confidentiality at any time. Any such Petition or Motion must be served on U S West, and U S West may then file a response or objection within 14 days thereafter. U S West's response may also request a hearing or oral argument before the Commission, including its grounds for such request.

(a) A person objecting to a privacy claim shall forthwith submit the matter to the Commission for its review. When the Commission rules on the question of whether any documents, data, information, studies or other matters are Proprietary Information, the Commission will enter an order resolving the issue.

(b) Any appropriate person may seek by appropriate pleading to have documents that have been designated as Proprietary Information in accordance with this order removed from the protective requirements of this order and placed in the public record. If the confidential nature of the Proprietary Information is challenged, resolution of the issue shall be made by a Hearing Examiner and/or the Commission after consideration of briefs and/or proceedings in camera, which shall be conducted under circumstances such that only those persons duly authorized hereunder to have access to such Proprietary Information shall be present. The record of any such in camera hearing shall be marked "CONFIDENTIAL--SUBJECT TO A PROTECTIVE ORDER." It shall be transcribed only upon agreement of all participating parties, or by order of the Hearing Examiner or the Commission; and in that event shall be separately bound, segregated, sealed, and withheld from inspection by any person not bound by the terms of this order, unless and until released from the restrictions of this order through agreement of the parties or pursuant to an order of the Hearing Examiner or the Commission. The Court Reporter shall also be required to sign an Exhibit "A." In the event that the Hearing Examiner or the Commission should rule in response to such a pleading that any information should be removed from the protective requirements of this order, the

Commission and any other persons with access to the Proprietary Information shall not disclose such information or use it in the public record for a period of seven (7) business days thereafter, so that U S West shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to seek a stay or other appropriate relief.

6. Seal. While in the custody of the PSC and MCC, materials subject to this order shall be marked "CONFIDENTIAL--SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER," and due to its private nature shall not be considered as records in the possession or retained by the PSC or MCC within the meaning of the open meetings or public records statutes.

7. Use in Pleadings, Briefs, etc. Where reference to Proprietary Information is required in pleadings, briefs, argument or motions, it shall be by citation to title or exhibit number, or some other nonconfidential description. Any further use or substantive reference to Proprietary Information shall be placed in a separate section of the pleading or brief and submitted to the Commission under seal. This sealed section shall be served only upon counsel (one copy each) who have signed an Exhibit "A." All the protections afforded in this order apply to materials prepared and distributed pursuant to this paragraph.

8. (a) Use in Commission Orders. The Hearing Examiner or the Commission will attempt to refer to proprietary Information in only a general or conclusionary form, and to the greatest extent possible, will avoid reproduction of Proprietary Information in any decision or ruling. If it is necessary to discuss Proprietary Information in greater detail, it shall be placed in a separate section of the order under seal. This sealed section shall be served only on counsel (one copy each) who have signed

an Exhibit "A." Counsel for other parties shall receive the cover sheet to the sealed portion and may review the sealed portion on file with the Commission after signing an Exhibit "A."

(b) Summary for Record. U S West shall prepare a nonproprietary written summary of the Proprietary Information referred to in this order for placement on the public record.

9. The PSC and its counsel and staff, and the MCC and its counsel and staff, shall be bound by the terms of this Order.

10. Segregation of Files. All Proprietary Information filed with the Commission shall be sealed by the Commission, segregated in the files of the Commission, and withheld from inspection by any person not bound by the terms of this order, unless such Proprietary Information is released from the restrictions of the order either through agreement of the parties, an order of the Commission, or an order of a Court having competent jurisdiction. All written Proprietary Information coming into the possession of the MCC under this order may be retained by him in his office files, but shall be withheld from inspection by others, except for his staff and his counsel, unless released by agreement, an order of the Commission and/or an order of a court.

11. Preservation of Confidentiality. All persons who may be entitled to receive, or who are afforded access to any Proprietary Information by reason of this order shall neither use nor disclose the Proprietary Information for purposes of business or competition, or any purpose other than those described in Paragraph 2 above, and then solely as contemplated herein, and shall take reasonable precautions to keep the Proprietary Information secure and in accordance with the purposes and intent of this order.

12. Reservation of Rights. The persons hereto affected by the terms of this Protective Order retain the right to question, challenge, and object to the admissibility (in any proceeding before the PSC or other appropriate body) of any information furnished under the terms of this Protective Order, on the grounds of relevancy or materiality.

This order shall in no way constitute any waiver of the rights of any person to contest any assertion or finding on the right of privacy, confidentiality or privilege, and to appeal any such determination of the Commission.

13. Applicability/Term. This order shall only apply to information supplied to the PSC by U S West pursuant to Schedules 23, 24(f) and 27 of the 1996 PSC Annual Report Forms for Telecommunications Utilities.

This Protective Order shall only be in effect for the 1996 PSC Annual Report Forms for Telecommunications Utilities filed by U S West. It shall not apply to Annual Reports filed in subsequent years unless a new motion is filed and granted by the PSC.

14. Amendment or Modification. The Commission retains jurisdiction of this matter and may alter or amend the provisions hereof as it deems appropriate, upon its own motion, or a motion by an appropriate person, after reasonable notice.

**DISSENT OF COMMISSIONER ROWE**  
**PROTECTIVE ORDER, DOCKET NO. N97.6.115, ORDER NO. 6024a**

U S West failed to demonstrate an adequate basis for keeping the material at issue under a protective order. This is an issue I have discussed in great detail in previous opinions, and will not revisit here. An acceptable action upon U S West's request for a protective order would have been a factual hearing with the burden of proof on U S West.

This situation is also procedurally unique in that the Commission, on its own motion, reconsidered and reversed its decision denying the protective order, which had been entered July 8, 1997. Under the Commission's rules, requests for reconsideration by parties must be made within ten days and orders are generally considered final after thirty days.
